Where tradition & values flourish

Our nation has come together for a Jubilee and a Coronation and is feeling the impacts of turbulent political decisions at home, crises in the wider world and changes in weather patterns.

In 2022, I completed the 'Conquer the Cold' outdoor water challenge for a local charity. The process invigorated my aim to support mental health and wellbeing and I now volunteer with a couple of regional charities. Embracing Acts of Kindness is one way I express my gratitude towards our staff for their work and commitment to producing the best product we can for our customers.

Mum's 80th was in 2023: Sheila has been integral to the shaping of our independent family nursery. We also celebrated Long Service Awards: Giles - 25 yrs; Rachel - 30 yrs and Gavin, Container Manager, and Peter, Team Leader of Open Ground, both marked 40 yrs - gaining the RHS Long Service Award certificate and medal.

Amanda has taken over from Diane in the Accounts Department and we welcome Leonie to assist in the Office with customer orders.

From sunsets over frosted grasses to the migratory return of House Martins skimming our fields gathering insects, we are grateful for the beautiful countryside we are nestled and working within. An Oystercatcher pair has nested here for 5 years now.

In 2024 we will widen and dig more deeply our 2nd reservoir to strengthen our resilience and remain self-sufficient for water for the entire container and propagation area

The Propagation Department is trialling different growing media, aiming to be peat-free by 2025. We are 100% peat-free when potting on. A coding system on the availability list highlights our progress: *PR* (peat reduced - grown in 60% peat-free media); *APF* (almost peat-free - a peat plug grown in peat-free media); *PF* (peat-free - grown in 100% peat-free media). A new logo is on our retail labels.

We aim to work sensitively within our environment: we gained 50% funding in 2022 for installing 116 solar panels bringing our total to 156 supported with 2 Tesla batteries; biological pest control has been fully integrated into our plant management systems; a wildflower meadow is being created and we are also installing raised (heated) propagation beds, fuelled by our solar energy.

We have been interrogating our waste stream: all our tie-on labels are now fully kerbside-recyclable, and our trolley wrap has bigger holes (better for plants and less waste). What we can't repurpose, we offer to local charities; we are working with the new packaging waste regulations (EPR) and have retained our Gold Suffolk Carbon Charter Award.

Do check *Instagram* for up-to-date Nursery news: in 2022 we held a customer open day, in 2023 we offered limited Iris field viewings, in the winter we'll offer new customer mornings.

Thank you to all our customers long-standing and new; individual and corporate; we value your support and look forward to continually serving you.

We are specialist producers of Herbaceous Perennial Plants, growing two million plants annually in over 1600 varieties, as either field grown plants or in a range of container sizes, predominantly 9 cm or 2 Litre. We also do a small range in 5L. Our main markets are other nurseries, garden centres, garden designers, landscapers and local authorities.

Howard Nurseries was founded over fifty years ago and has steadily grown so that it now covers over 150 acres of land employing approximately 40 people plus seasonal staff as required.

As a wholesale nursery we are almost unique in the United Kingdom in offering an extensive range of field and container grown perennials. By propagating over 90% of our crops in house, we have control of quality and trueness to type. We have a good reputation for the generous size of our field grown plants. At all times we will strive to provide the best quality plants. We take great pride in our plants and to ensure they reach you in good condition we use our own transport and drivers where possible.

Visits Welcome to the Nursery

We welcome (potential) customers to visit the nursery on special customer or open days which will be communicated via Instagram. We regret we are no longer able to have customers walk the nursery on their own. Collection days are only on Thursday and Friday.

Monday - Thursday 8.00am - 4.30pm and Friday 8.00am - 3.30pm We regret we are not normally open on a Saturday or Sunday.

Prices will continue to be shown solely on our regularly refreshed Availability List ensuring you can make your selection from our widest and most up to date range at the best price available. We have included a Recommended Retail Price (RRP) for our garden centre customers but those can change to suit customer requirements.

Ordering and Availability

All plants are offered subject to availability at the point of call-off, e.g. advanced orders for spring can be affected by weather induced losses. We will not knowingly oversell but will contact you if orders seem to be lingering to free up stock in time if necessary. Orders are processed in order of receipt and an acknowledgement is emailed as appropriate. Retail nurseries and landscapers are now able to order online.


Deliveries






Propagation at Howard Nurseries

Our propagation department is responsible for producing more than 90% of our own stock for both field and container production. Propagation methods include, division, seed sowing, stem/tip cuttings, root cuttings as well as the pricking out of tissue culture. We utilise 6 different growing environments, 5 of which can be controlled for optimum growing conditions, before finally going outside to harden off before planting out or potting on. We clean and reuse our plug trays every year, some are now more than 15 years old and still going strong!








Field growing at Howard Nurseries

As with any planting project correct ground preparations are the key to getting a good result and this is also true for our field grown production. From cultivating the ground to more extreme measures such as the renewal of drainage, every effort is taken to ensure that we can produce the best quality plants. We begin field planting as soon as weather and soil conditions allow and utilise both a module and disc planter to help plant the wide range of field grown varieties that we have available. Irrigation is at times necessary during our dry Suffolk summers, often providing its own logistical puzzle. At times the borehole water used to irrigate our field crops can need to travel as far as 1.5 miles from extraction point to end destination!

The energy generated by our solar panels will now be stored in two Tesla batteries and then re-used on site to power our buggies, potting machines and office computers.





















- 3. Prices are subject to the VAT rate at the time (currently 20%). Payment becomes due, net at 30 days from invoice date. Accounts not settled within this period will be subject to a credit charge of 5% after 30 days. We are able to accept payment via credit and debit card and BACS payment.
- 4. We offer either of the following discounts for payment within **15 days** of the invoice date, however this does not apply if other discounts have been agreed.
 - 1. 2.5% on goods delivered.
 - 2. 5% on goods collected from the nursery.
 - 3. Any discount not taken will only be repaid, if claimed, within 60 days of invoice date.
- 5. All deliveries are subject to a carriage charge for which an estimate can be provided. The actual cost will be invoiced and might differ from the estimate.
- We would appreciate three or more working days' notice where possible for collection of orders
 from the nursery. We generally give one week's notice of a delivery date during our Autumn/Winter
 period.
 - When ordering please state whether you would like a delivery or whether you will be making a collection, a specific time you would prefer delivery or collection and lastly whether substitutes are acceptable or not acceptable. This will help us when entering your order on our system.
- Collection days are Thursday and Friday only.
 We regret we no longer offer walkabouts on the nursery.
- 8. No order is too small for our attention but due to the size of the nursery, all 9cm and open ground orders fewer than twelve of any variety will be subject to a charge of 45p per plant.
- 9. Individual colour labels are available upon request at 15p each. This will be a self-printed, high-quality plastic label. These can include the plant name, picture, description, your company logo, and colour scheme. We are happy to provide a sample of these by request. Please note a batch label identifying the variety will be supplied automatically at no extra charge.
- 10. Both our open ground and pot grown orders are generally lifted and supplied between the months of October and April. However, our pot grown varieties are offered all year round (subject to availability). Our main 2 litre perennial season is between March and August.
- 11. We do require all new customers to provide payment prior to dispatch of an initial order.
- 12. We reserve the right to charge up to 50% of the value on cancelled orders.
- 13. Generally, quotations are valid for one month unless stock is sold.
- 14. Please ensure any complaints are made within **SEVEN DAYS** of dispatch.
- 15. All goods shall remain the property of Howard Nurseries Ltd until payment has been received in full.
